Standing Committee Sits Down

I am privileged to have been appointed to the Manitoba Teachers' Society Collective Bargaining Standing Committee (CBSC). This committee, comprised of MTS members from every region of the province, consults with MTS staff on matters relating to Collective Bargaining. The most recent meeting of the CBSC was on Saturday, December 2, where we sat down to discuss the unique situation in which we find ourselves. In Manitoba, each Local Association bargains separately with its Board of Trustees. As a result, we generally have had the various collective agreements terminating in different years across the province. This next round of bargaining will see every provincial Local opening negotiations at the same time. MTS staff play a major role in all local negotiations, so this will be a busy time for them. As you know, our own collective bargaining team has been hard at work preparing for negotiations. Their second meeting is scheduled for early in the New Year.
